Excused vs. unexcused absences, and their effect on course grade:

Assignment grading rubric:

I will evaluate your submitted work – including all homework assignments and exams – using percentages, letter grades, or pass/fail as appropriate to the assignment.

Assignments that quiz your understanding of a specific skill will be graded P/F. Pass = 100%, Fail = 0%.

Assignments that are more qualitative in nature will be given a letter grade. Letter grades will be converted as follows: A+ (100%), A (95%), A- (91%); B+ (89%), B (85%), B- (81%); C+ (79%), C (75%), C- (71%); D+ (69%), D (65%), D- (61%); F (0%–59%, at my discretion).

Semester grading rubric:

When calculating your semester grade I will use the following rubric to translate percentages to letter grades.

Prerequisite:

Completed or concurrent enrollment in Theory/ETSS I or III.

Course overview:

Beginning KPM parallels the written curriculum of the theory/ETSS major track. Assignments will be given in coordination with the schedule of topics studied in Theory/ETSS I–IV. The primary goal of the course is to ensure a minimum proficiency in playing scales and chord progressions at the keyboard. Through individual and small-group instruction, students will also develop their skills in score reading, clef reading and transposition, improvisation, elementary piano technique, and analysis and performance of standard keyboard literature.

Prior knowledge of the piano is neither assumed nor required. Beginning KPM is intended primarily for Linfield music majors.

Student objectives:

1. Demonstrate mastery of the major and minor scales in all keys and all qualities at the piano, with correct fingering.

2. Demonstrate fluency in playing harmonic paradigms and progressions.

3. Demonstrate improved facility at the keyboard through #1 and #2 as well as through exercises in reading, transposition, and improvisation.

4. Prepare one work from the standard keyboard literature (17th through 21st centuries) or one work relating to the student's major performance area (i.e. choral reductions, accompaniments, orchestral pieces), for evaluation during the final exam. The work must be learned in its entirety (single movements are accepted as complete works). It may be played under tempo.

Assignments:

Assignments will be given in response to individual student progress and needs.
